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ABOUT THE POETRY SCHOOL

The Poetry School was founded in 1997 by poets Jane Duran, Mimi Khalvati and Pascale Petit. Since our earliest years, our courses and activities have encouraged poets and poetry to flourish, and we count many successful publishing and performing writers amongst our past and current students. Students, tutors and staff are all at different stages with their poetry. We have a wide variety of skills and interests, but all of us share a desire to improve our skills, expand our horizons and develop an audience for our work within a community of poets.

Our Tutors

Some of our tutors are T S Eliot Prize winners, some have just published their first pamphlets, all are practising poets. We delight in their writing, are inspired by their teaching skills and welcome the introduction of their ideas to our students. We are also interested in developing poets' teaching skills, so if you'd like to teach for us, email programme@poetryschool.com to start a conversation.

What to Expect

Poetry School activities are friendly and relatively informal, with between 6 and 16 students in a group. In a teaching session, you might be given **Exercises** (specific writing tasks to inspire your own poems or ideas) or **Feedback** (comments on your work by tutors and / or other students); you might be **Reading** (close attention to published poems, looking for examples of technique, style, theme or form), **Writing** (working towards creating new poems throughout the duration of the course or workshop) or a combination of all these, and some courses will include tasks for you to work on at home.

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Some activities aim to pass on knowledge in a very structured way, some are designed to be sessions in which the creatively unexpected occurs. If you have a preference for a particular style of activity, contact the office to discuss the options. Many of our course groups create blogs or publications together, or head off for a drink after a session – students can be as solitary or social as they like!

Most of our courses and workshops accommodate writers with a wide range of experience, but some are specifically designed for beginners or more practised poets.

Here are our definitions –

Beginner – someone who is in love with words, and wants to start arranging the best of them into the best order. You may have written a few poems already, and you'll have an idea about who your favourite writers are.

Intermediate – have you been writing for a few years or more, and are you ready to submit poems to magazines and competitions, or perform them at readings? Perhaps you do so already.

Advanced – are you on your way to a large portfolio of your own writing, and becoming confident about what you want to say and how you want to say it? Are you thinking about a pamphlet, or a first collection, or headline spots at poetry readings?

If you're a beginner writer who likes to be stretched, or an advanced writer who'd like a refresher course, we can usually find a course to accommodate you.

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CONCESSIONS

Each Poetry School activity has three prices listed. The first is the standard price, the second is the price for over 60s, and the third is our **concessionary rate**. Concessions are currently available for...

- 25s and under
 - full time students
 - those who receive Job Seekers Allowance, Income Support, Working Tax Credit, Pension Credit, Universal Credit or Income Related Employment and Support Allowance

BURSARY AND PAYMENT PLANS

If you aren't eligible for the concessionary rate but can't afford the full cost of taking part in Poetry School activities, we invite you to apply for a bursary to cover up to 75% of activity costs. The maximum you can apply for is £300 in any given year, though in exceptional circumstances we may be able to offer more. Priority is given to people who have not received financial support from us before. For more information and to apply for a bursary, visit the Bursary section on our website. The deadline for applications for this term's bursaries is 18 August. The Poetry School bursary scheme is supported by the generosity of students and other donors, for which we are very grateful.

We can also arrange **payment plans** for those who would like to pay in instalments.

Booking is now open. The Poetry School is a small charitable arts organisation running on tight financial margins. **We'd be very grateful if you could book by 4 September, it helps us plan effectively - thank you!**

- No discounts on seminars, individual teaching or Travelling Workshops.

Hands up if you've been working out your poems for some time now, and you don't know where to go next. Maybe you feel like you need a new direction, a push. Hands up if you feel like you've been doing this thing for a while now, and have an inkling there's a next level, but you're confused as to what that is or quite how to get there. There are many routes into this next phase, and this course will present those to you. Whether you're looking to construct a portfolio of your best work, thinking of getting your first pamphlet publication-ready, entering competitions, or simply looking for that new avenue of creative exploration, this course is for you. You will be part of a supportive network of critical poet-peers and exposed to some of the best new approaches to poetry available. You will discuss your own work extensively, alongside that of your class mates, and receive feedback and further advice, tailored to your individual needs as a writer. We'll guide you toward the next stage of your poetry career.

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The Construction of the Poem

'On the simplest level, form functions for any poet as a kind of scaffold from which the poem can be constructed.' -- Michael Donaghy. *The Construction of the Poem* is a thirty-week course designed to give participants detailed knowledge of all aspects of the history and application of formal techniques in writing poetry. Sessions will be taught by different poets, based on their particular areas of expertise, so expect to be challenged and inspired by a variety of approaches and practices. From language and diction, to rhyme and rhythm, to lineation and verse forms (such as the sonnet and sestina), to more radical forms (such as prose poetry and concrete poetry) *The Construction of the Poem* will give you the tools of the trade needed to build the perfect poem. A Conversation with the Past: From Sappho to Basho

This is one of a trio of student-centred courses designed both for experienced writers looking to widen their repertoire and for beginners looking for a more structured approach to their writing. You will have the opportunity to consider how much of today's poetry has its roots in the work of innovative poets from the past and to workshop new poems in the context of this discussion. Drawing on the work of poets from a wide range of cultures and traditions (from Medieval Ireland to the Tang dynasty and from ancient Sumeria to Renaissance Italy) you will continue to develop your individual approach to writing and start to build up a body of creative work with a definite individual identity. Through exercises, reading, writing, group feedback and small group planning sessions, you will be encouraged to construct an independent voice, while maintaining a dialogue with poetic traditions.

Blake in Lambeth

Illuminate your writing with this Blakean explosion of

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word, image and London walking. Artist and poet Sophie Herxheimer, and Chris McCabe, poet and author of *Real South Bank*, have summoned the spirit of William Blake to inspire new works combining text and art. This course builds on a previous two-days walking and printmaking course led by Chris and Sophie, only this time there is further opportunity to read more deeply into Blake's poems, to write poetry in response to his ideas, and to consider collage as a visual form that captures the layered energies of London. William Blake lived in Lambeth between 1790 and 1800, creating his original techniques for fusing poetry with painting and printing, later writing 'from Lambeth we began our foundations, lovely Lambeth'. Herxheimer and McCabe will revisit these foundations with walks to Blakean sites to gather ideas and material for later work to be developed.

Child's Play

Callooh! Callay! All work and no play makes Jack a dull poet! Come and unleash your inner child with a series of poetic games and experiments designed to push, pull, skip, hop and pole-vault your poetry into new areas. We'll look at all sorts of different children in poetry, from Carroll's beamish boys to Plath's loud vowels rising like balloons, and reconnect with our own childhood selves. We'll also look at a wide range of different games that may be applied to your poetry writing, so you can approach the page in a different way -- from the Oulipian sublime to musical chairs. Get ready to sit down when the music stops and try something new.

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Hyper-Spectacle

Poetry is a revolutionary act. But where can poetry exist within a spectacular society that often fails to separate advertising from art, spin from reality? This course will focus on how to use poetry as a tool for interference in an ever-increasing media 'spectacle' in which words change their meaning rapidly. On the timely 50 year anniversary of Guy Debord's book, *The Society of the Spectacle*, we will use guerrilla tactics to write poetry where it has no business being, creating disturbances and surprises for an unsuspecting public. Emma will also be teaching a version of this course online – this is the first time we've run the same course in two places, and we're hoping for lots of fruitful cross-collaborations.

Play On: Live Music Inspiration

'O for mortals, what / Power there is in songs, / What greatest happiness / That can make bearable this / Short narrow channel of Life!' (Sophocles, tr Reginald Gibbons). What can music do for your poetry? What can your poetry do for music? In this short course you'll have the opportunity to use the experience of live music as a starting point for writing new poems. We'll begin

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with an experiential workshop with discussion of published poems that are inspired by music. You'll choose two contrasting concerts to go to in the month that follows, and using some tips and optional writing tools and constraints, you'll write poems that we'll workshop in the second session.

Foraging and Poetry

As well as a poet, Richard Osmond is a wild food forager, spending his days searching for wild fruit, herbs and fungi among the hedgerows of Hertfordshire. This practical, in-person session serves as introduction to our online course, *A Poet's Herbal: Useful Lore for the Poet Outdoors* but also stands alone as a separate session. Richard will meet you at Redbridge tube station, and you'll spend the day being inspired by nature. Instead of a lightbulb turning on above one's head, imagine a white mushroom appearing in the undergrowth. You'll be given practical advice on how to stay safe and informed when foraging, complete quick writing exercises based on the plants you encounter, and after a few hours outside the group will retreat to the pub. The session will finish at Wanstead tube station. A full immersion in the world of foraging, giving you perspective to inform your future ventures into nature.

Flamboyance

Would you love to give your poetry some much-needed

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oomph? Would you love to add glitz to your titles, an edge to your imagery and glitter to your subject matter? Would you love to take risks in your writing? Are you willing to consider excess, even 'bad taste'? This workshop will consider flamboyance and exuberance, with a focus on the poetry of Peter Redgrove. No previous knowledge of Redgrove's work is necessary. Come prepared to bang words, images and ideas together – and to write, a lot.

Language, structure and style: a course for teachers and educators

This course is designed with teachers and educators in mind and offers a way of acquiring secure technical knowledge to support teaching about poetry and the participants' own writing. Developed in association with Poetry By Heart (www.poetrybyheart.com) and adapted from 'The Construction of the Poem' and other Poetry School courses, these sessions are designed to give participants detailed knowledge of all aspects of the history and application of formal techniques in writing poetry. Aspects of form will be illustrated with examples taken from Poetry By Heart's print timeline anthology and from Forward's *Poems of the Decade*, currently a set text for Edexcel. Examples will include readings and recitations as well as printed text, and there will be additional coverage of poetry memorisation and recitation from Poetry By Heart.

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Voice Workshop for Poets

In this introductory workshop, we will explore alignment and physical release, bringing awareness to how we breathe and how voiced sound is created. We will be doing exercises to free the voice and develop its range and resonance. How can voice work lift images off the page? How can we communicate effectively and clearly when reading poetry to a live audience? Please wear loose, comfortable clothing and bring a poem that you are happy to share with the group. The workshop will be practical, informative and fun!

Displacement

What does the theme of 'displacement' mean to you? The moving on of a protestor, exile from one's home country, something more psychological? We'll be publishing 'displacement' writing prompts in the run up to the session.

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Poetry & Visual Art: Margate & London

Poets have long drawn inspiration from painters and sculptors; with the rise of a new generation of artists challenging traditional media, can we find in them a source for poems which push boundaries in a similar manner? We will visit gallery spaces to engage with contemporary art and to encourage new poems in response. The course will be held over two Saturdays: the first day for gallery visits, the second day to workshop poems stemming from the gallery experience. The gallery day will take place at Turner Contemporary in Margate, where artist John Davies will give a talk on two major sculptural works, *Scarecrows* and *My Ghosts*. Participants will also have an opportunity to view a retrospective exhibition on Jean Arp, with particular focus on his poetry; and Tracey Emin's controversial work, *My Bed*. This will be followed by a workshop session back at the Poetry School. Travel guidance will be on the website.

Empathy

'How difficult is it for one body to feel the injustice wheeled at another?' Claudia Rankine's question points towards the possibilities and the limits of empathy, our capacity to cross the border between 'self' and 'other'. Looking at poems that invite us to try on someone else's shoes – or question the attempt – we'll range from questions about 'lyric', to mirror neurons, to cultural appropriation, through a mixture of reading, discussion and writing.

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ONLINE COURSES

All online courses take place in CAMPUS, our social network for poets. In CAMPUS, students use a Facebook-style platform to chat with friends both privately and publicly, participate in live chats, submit poems and download learning resources.

Interactive courses last 10 weeks, consisting of one assignment posted per 'session' every fortnight. Each session, you will be expected to post poems in response to the assignment within a week, after which students will begin to feed back on each other's work in their unique CAMPUS online group forum. Each session culminates in a 2 hour live chatroom discussion with your course tutor, where all the latest poems are discussed in a free-flowing, live-typed discussion. All live chats are then transcribed and archived for students to re-read whenever they want. New assignments are posted after each live chat.

International courses are exactly the same as Interactive courses, but there are no live chats, making them accessible to students who live in all international time zones. All feedback on these courses is written.

Feedback courses have no live chat component or assignments and focus on the close editing of existing poems. Students share and leave written feedback within their CAMPUS online group forum only. These courses are suitable for UK and international students.

Studios are short, intensive poetry writing courses that last 3-4 weeks and have no live chat component. They have a minimal focus on group feedback and editing, and are suitable for all UK and international students.

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Masterclasses are 12 week courses (spread over 6 sessions) with a deep consideration of technical craft and critical theory. For advanced students only: fluency with poetic language and ideas will be assumed. There are no live chats and they are suitable for UK and International students

Please note: Online courses are open to all students but a basic level of digital literacy is essential. The Poetry School can help you with CAMPUS technical issues, but you need to be a confident user of digital platforms to take part in these classes. The Unsent, Unanswered Letter

Beginning with Ted Hughes' *Birthday Letters*, we will incorporate the 'I' and 'you' into poems written to a particular addressee. We will then create imaginary email correspondences, write letters to our future selves, and draft epistolary vignettes that evoke those feelings that are most difficult to articulate: guilt, regret, loneliness, hope and pain. (This is a repeat of a course that has run previously.)

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Word Power: Poetry and Ritual

We will also consider the uses of ritual as part of our personal writing process, working to discover how ritual processes might encourage and inspire new and different kinds of work. Re-Make Believe: Shaping the Fairytale

In this course we'll be experimenting and exploring the potential of the poem sequence – freeing ourselves from the straightjacket of '40 lines or less'.

The Lyric Essay

What happens if we trust the impulse that moves our mind from one thought to another without ever merely explaining or telling the story straight? This course will look at the lyric essay, a genre-mixing attempt to bring the process of essay writing closer to the sensibility of the lyric form. A relatively new category of writing – not quite poem, narrative, memoir, nor an idea-driven essay, but something ‘other’, recently popularised by writers such as Maggie Nelson and Claudia Rankine - the lyric essay will help us guide our inner voice in more open and intuitive directions, provoking all the quirky, vivid details of genuine thought.

Our Hospitable Languages: Writing Multilingual Poetry

Languages welcome newcomers. They like to mingle, blunder and tease. They cannot be walled off or purified. As language

To explore the hospitality of English, we will read the work of five multilingual poets and then write our own multilingual poems, challenging the boundaries between domestic and foreign.

To look at the brokenness within and around us and still choose to write poems of praise is an act of resistance. From romantic and sensual pieces written for/inspired by lovers and ex-lovers, to poems for children, places, friends, parents, lost ones, the body, God, and the self, we'll consider how love poems are inherently political in their insistence on wonder, and we'll attempt to do what Rainer Maria Rilke describes in the following lines: 'O tell us, poet, what is it you do? --I praise.'

Speaking in Tones: Crafting Musical Poetry

Our language-making is inseparable from our musical sense;

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as Duke Ellington famously said, 'It don't mean a thing (if it ain't got that swing).' On this course we'll look at how to craft a musical poem by studying some of the basics of metrical poetry and investigating how sound works within the poetic line. Students will learn how to create an ear-pleasing poetry, with a special focus on tempo, pacing, crafting a line in iambic pentameter and the effective use of line breaks. More broadly, we'll consider how sound works as a gateway to the senses and how musicality creates its own kind of meaning within a poem.

MASTERCLASS

Fragments: The Bed of the Imaginary

Roland Barthes listed these modes of writing as examples of literary fragments: 'haiku, maxim, pensée [and] journal entry'. Fragmentary approaches to poetry, popular with the Modernists and again with the Postmodernists, is having a revival due, in part, to the influences of the internet and social media. In this genre-bending course, we will look at poets, fiction writers, philosophers and psychoanalysts who think and write in fragments, use techniques of interruption, or whose work survives in fragment form. 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STUDIOS

Poetry Studios are short, intensive poetry writing courses that last 3 weeks, cramming all the content of a weekend workshop into a few online sessions. Unlike our standard 10 week courses, the emphasis on 'Studios' is more heavily skewed towards writing and getting words on the page, with a softer focus on group feedback and editing. There are no live chats, and a portfolio of reading material will be submitted in advance.

Stand-Up Poetry Studio

Each principle will be drawn from a stand-up routine and further illustrated in works by various poets who have been enchanted by oral genres, as well as those who perform in the burgeoning 'stand-up poetry' scene today.

On the timely 50 year anniversary of Guy Debord's book, *The Society of the Spectacle*, we will use guerrilla tactics to write poetry where it has no business being, creating disturbances and surprises for an unsuspecting public.

Art Thieves Studio: Robbing Techniques from the Artist

The boundary between poetry and visual art is porous and well-traversed. Mentoring – £800: The price is for a committed working relationship with a mentor for between 8 and 12 months, to include 6 x one hour face-to-face sessions or 1,000 word email commentaries on 250 lines of poetry at a time, personalised reading and writing tasks, and guidance on next steps towards publication and life as a working poet.
